






Our take on property tax relief: Tier One rate compression is revenue neutral for school districts by design.

Homestead exemption increases have historically been paired with short-lived hold harmlesses that leave schools shortchanged.

Also, the more targeted tax relief is (i.e. only for homeowners, only for 65+/disabled), the more complicated the hold harmless is.

State is reflecting on the increasing costs of hold harmlesses included in recent legislation




- Unveiled as part of broader public education packaged include HB 3 on vouchers, HB 4 on accountability,
 HB 6 on student discipline, HB 100 on instructional materials and HB 123 on early literacy and math skills.
- HB 2 makes various increases to the school funding formulas (article 1); changes to teacher certification pathways (article 2); and special education (article 3).
- House leadership estimates that the bill spends \$7.6
 billion.


By Rep. Buckley

- The bill spends \$3.2 billion to increase the basic allotment from \$6,160 to \$6,380.
- Increases the required compensation increase from 30 percent of the per-student gain to 40 percent.
- Requires changes to salary schedule to differentiate first-year teachers that are certified vs. uncertified.

Adds new restrictions on use of uncertified teachers in foundation courses, regardless of DOI status.


Creates new grant to offset retire/rehire penalty.


- Makes sweeping changes to teacher education pipelines and certification pathways.
- Creates new allotment to districts that help teachers complete preservice practice hours (\$8k-\$24k base amounts)
- Creates a new allotment to provide stipends for mentors (\$1,000 per mentor).
- Creates a new allotment for completion of teacher
 literacy (\$1,000) or math achievement (\$500) academies


- Spends \$1.8 billion to transition special education funding from being based on instructional arrangements to intensity of services provided.
- Spends \$100 million to fund special education evaluations.
- Spends \$4 million to increase special education transportation funding and \$2 million to increase special education CCMR Outcomes Bonus weights.
- Provides various other grants to support autistic students and recruiting special education staff.


- Spends \$1.0 billion to increase the small and mid-sized district weights for ISDs.
- Increases Teacher Incentive Allotment weights, with higher increases going to rural and high-needs campuses.

Also, creates an "enhanced" TIA system designation that would unlock 10 percent additional funding.

Requires all teachers to be eligible. Principles and Aps must have a compensation system based on performance as well.








- Increases Compensatory Education Allotment weights by around \$30 per student (with BA increase, overall biennial allotment gain of around \$600 million).
- Creates a new High School Advising Allotment that provides \$50,000 for every 200 11th & 12th graders enrolled. Advising program must meet other requirements as well.
- Spends \$30 million to create a new Fine Arts Allotment.

As Filed







- Spends up to \$50 million to offset ADA declines of more than 5 percent.
- Make various reforms to the Additional Days School Year Incentive including 50 percent ADSY funding increase for districts that provide 200 instructional days for K-8 students.
- Would allow for certain pre-K students participating through Workforce Commission partnerships to generate full-day funding.

Would allow special education students to generate halfday pre-K funding.

As Filed

- Spends an estimated \$200 million on a new state aid allotment for districts in ESCs 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 (i.e. districts along the gulf coast) of \$55 per ADA to offset increased insurance costs.
- Spends an estimated \$252 million to increase charter facility funding. Adds new conditions for charters to receive facility funding.





As Filed



By Rep. Buckley

- Spends \$120 million to create a new funding adjustment to temporarily hold districts harmless if state values are assigned. Amount is reduced each year state values are assigned.
- Appears to make significant reductions to existing M&O hold harmless funding tied to recent property tax relief measures (i.e. increased homestead, tax relief for 65+/disabled, tax compression)

We have some concerns regarding bill language that we have raised with TEA and Buckley's office. All are currently working toward a fix.

- Passed out of committee on Feb. 24th. Passed out of the Senate on Feb. 26th.
- Creates a Teacher Retention Allotment that would provide:

For districts with > 5,000 enrolled \$2,500 for each classroom teacher 3-4 years of experience \$5,500 for each classroom teacher 5+ years of experience

For districts with ≤ 5,000 enrolled \$5,000 for each classroom teacher 3-4 years of experience \$10,000 for each classroom teacher 5+ years of experience

By Sen. Creighton

- Increases TIA similarly to what is in HB 2.
- Would allow the children of teachers to be eligible for halfday state funded prekindergarten.
- The bill would direct TEA to contract with a third party to help teachers understand their rights, as well as providing liability insurance for classroom teachers.







As Engrossed



By Sen. Bettencourt

- Passed out of committee on Feb. 11th and out of Senate on Feb. 13th.
- The bill would increase the homestead exemption for school taxes up from \$100,000 to \$140,000.
- The bill includes a hold harmless on both the M&O and I&S sides.

I&S hold harmless only covers debt eligible for state aid as of Jan. 1, 2025 (i.e. for which a payment was made prior to Sept. 1, 2023).



 Includes a penalty for districts whose I&S revenues (local collections + state aid) exceed their minimum debt service.

Districts with collections + state aid above required debt services would see their I&S state aid until revenues are in line with debt service requirements.

An amendment adopted on the floor would ensure that districts at least received the full I&S hold harmless tied to the new \$100,000 to \$140,000 homestead exemption increase.


 We are encouraging districts to estimate the benefits defeasing debt early has had for their taxpayers and will be sharing that with lawmakers soon.




By Sen. Huffman

- Scheduled for hearing on Mar. 5th.
- The bill would double the school safety allotment by changing student multiplier from \$10 to \$20 and campus multiplier from \$15,000 to \$30,000.







As Filed



By Sen. Bettencourt

- Has not been set for hearing
- Bill would transition special education funding to be based on intensity of services, rather than instructional arrangements.
- Would provide districts \$500 per special education evaluation conducted (HB2 is \$1,000).
- Would create new grant programs to support autistic students, as well as provide training and other supports to special education staff.





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
